APPENDIX 1. METHODOLOGY

ABOUT THE SURVEY

In 2022, HRC Foundation and faculty at the University of Connecticut fielded the 2022 LGBTQ+ Youth Study, a 150+ question online quantitative survey on the multiple factors and experiences that influence the wellbeing of queer youth. LGBTQ+ youth, who were aged 13-18 and openly identified as LGBTQ+ completed the survey between January and October 2022, via Qualtrics.com.

Initial results from the survey, focusing on all LGBTQ+ youth, regardless of race/ethnicity were published as the 2023 LGBTQ+ Youth Report. A further description of the survey recruitment methodology can be found in the main report. For the present report, we explored many of the same outcomes among just respondents who were diagnosed with a disability by a healthcare provider.

ABOUT THE SAMPLE

Youth were eligible to participate in the original survey if they (a) self-identified as LGBTQ+; (b) were 13-18 years of age; (c) resided in the United States of America at the time of survey completion; and (d) consented to be part of the survey.

17,578 respondents were deemed eligible, consented to participate, and started the survey, a total of 12,706 (72.3%) of whom completed at least half of the questions, provided valid information on LGBTQ+ identity, age, and race, and thus were eligible for inclusion in the original report.

For the present report, a total of 3,699 had been diagnosed with a disability and are included in this analysis, the vast majority of whom (3,072) were transgender and gender expansive.

ABOUT THE ANALYSIS

All analyses were run in Stata (v.17) by HRC Foundation researchers. Results are unweighted and reflect the raw counts and percentages of respondents who report each outcome, as described below.



This report provides an overview of key findings among disabled LGBTQ+ youth from the 2022 LGBTQ+ Youth Survey. It does not attempt to represent all disabled LGBTQ+ youth and the intersectional experiences across the LGBTQ+ community.

The HRC Foundation will be releasing future analyses of this survey data exploring how different experiences, identities and variables interact to contribute to the well-being of queer and trans youth, as well as exploring additional outcomes and sectors of daily life.

ABOUT THE MEASURES

Disability is assessed in the survey two different ways in the survey:

Self-diagnosed: Do you consider yourself to have a disability

<u>Diagnosed by a provider</u>: Were you ever told by a doctor, healthcare provider or mental health care provider that you have a disability?

Unless otherwise indicated, "youth with a disability" is defined as those who report having a disability diagnosed by a provider. Additionally, type of disability is assessed based on the following:

- Psychiatric disability/mental illness
- Another type
