



## MARRIAGE EQUALITY AND THE SUPREME COURT: Methodology and Tables

### 1. Methodology

#### A. Data & Weighting

Data come from the 2025 Annual LGBTQ+ Community Survey (ALCS) and were collected online from September 29 to October 27, 2025, among U.S. adults aged 18 and older. The LGBTQ+ sample was drawn through the HRC Foundation's Community Marketing & Insights research panel of LGBTQ+ adults as well as from participants recruited from community organizations, while the non-LGBTQ+ sample was fielded by [PSB Insights](#) during the same period. To ensure demographic representativeness, PSB used quotas for respondents' race, age, geography, education, and gender.

Post-survey weighting was applied to correct for non-probability sampling bias and align the dataset with external benchmarks. Within-group analyses (e.g., married LGBTQ+ vs. Single LGBTQ+ respondents) are computed using weight *allwt*, which does not apply a scaling factor and ensure large sample sizes for subgroup analyses. The weight *allwt\_scaled* is employed for national estimates and between group comparisons (e.g., LGBTQ+ vs. Non-LGBTQ+ respondents).

#### B. Estimation Strategy

Due to sample size, estimates for support of same-sex marriage for the general U.S. adult population are design-based proportions. Other estimates for support of same-sex marriage and having hardly any confidence in the Supreme Court are odds-ratios and predicted probabilities from logistic regression with robust standard errors:

$$\ln\left(\frac{\Pr(Y_i = 1)}{1 - \Pr(Y_i = 1)}\right) = \alpha + \sum_{j=1}^k \beta_j X_{ji} + C'_i \gamma_+ \varepsilon_i$$

All models control for respondents' demographic characteristics, including race/ethnicity, age, and education level. The baseline category is white respondents aged 18–24 with a high school education. These controls were included to adjust for compositional differences in the sample that may confound estimates of group or attitudinal effects. Support for same-sex marriage also includes variables for relationship status and political ideology. Within-group analyses for non-LGBTQ+

individuals include whether the respondent knows an LGBTQ+ person (this question was only asked to non-LGBTQ+ individuals).

### C. Limitations

AmeriSpeak and Gallup polls are not direct comparisons due to differences in survey mode and questionnaire design. AmeriSpeak relies on both web and telephone surveys, while ALCS is pure a web-based survey. Additionally, Gallup's question about same-sex marriage is worded differently than ALCS.

Due to the nonprobability design, design-based statistics such as Pearson and Wald statistics are to be interpreted with caution. Results are not causal.
