Background

The Continued Importance of Domestic Partner Benefits





Why cover domestic partner benefits?

Many employers think the *Obergefell* decision negates the need for domestic partner benefits. This is incorrect.

While marriage equality is a huge step, LGBTQ+ individuals remain at risk for discrimination that creates barriers to exercising their legal right to marry.

In more than half of the states in the country, discrimination against LGBTQ+ people is still legal in the following areas of life:

 Housing, access to public places, federal funding, credit, education, jury service and more





Current and New Criteria

Inclusive Spousal and Domestic Partner Benefits





Current Spousal and Domestic Partner Benefits Criteria

Inclusive Spousal and Domestic Partner Benefits (20)

- Equivalency in same- and different-sex spousal medical and soft benefits (10)
- Equivalency in same- and different-sex domestic partner medical and soft benefits (10)





New Spousal and Domestic Partner Benefits Criteria

Inclusive Spousal and Domestic Partner Benefits (20)

- Equivalency in same- and different-sex spousal medical and soft benefits (No points awarded)
- Equivalency in same- and different-sex domestic partner medical and soft benefits (10)
- Equivalency in spousal and domestic partner family formation benefits regardless of sex (10)





What are "Soft" Benefits?

In the CEI we evaluate many non-medical benefits like leave, retirement, and others. We score the following benefits:

- FMLA/ "FMLA-like" equivalent policy
- Bereavement leave
- Employer-offered supplement life insurance
- Relocation/travel assistance
- Employee discounts
- Employee Assistance Program
- QJSA/QJSA-equivalent
- QPSA/QPSA-equivalent
- Cash-balance plans

Soft benefits and family formation benefits are evaluated based on parity. This means an employer is not required to have a specific benefit, just that the existing benefits extend to spouses and partners regardless of sex

PLEASE NOTE: Some benefits are for use on the behalf of spouses/partners, such as taking leave.





What are Family Formation Benefits?

In the new CEI criteria we will evaluate many family formation benefits. We will score the following benefits:

- Adoption benefit
- Cryopreservation (Egg and sperm freezing)
- Paid family leave (i.e. not FMLA)
- Foster care assistance
- Infertility treatment coverage (non-IVF)
- Fertility/IVF coverage
- Surrogacy benefit

Soft benefits and family formation benefits are evaluated based on parity. This means an employer is not required to have a specific benefit, just that the existing benefits extend to spouses and partners regardless of sex



THE LOOK FORWARD The Parity Principle

In order to earn full credit for domestic partner benefits, employers must offer ALL of the following standard medical benefits regardless of sex:

- Health
- Dental
- Vision
- Dependent health
- "COBRA-like" equivalent

All other benefits are only evaluated and scored on the basis of parity. Meaning that *existing* benefits should be equitable. An employer will not lose points for simply not offering these additional benefits at all.

Please note: FMLA is a federally mandated benefit that extends to the care of spouses. An FMLA-like equivalent policy should be extended for domestic partner care



Necessary Documentation

Benefit Eligibility and Proof of Relationship





Acceptable Documentation

We will need up to two pieces of documentation in order to award full credit

Eligibility documentation (usually an SPD or an excerpt of an SPD)

 Eligibility should clearly indicate unmarried domestic partners are eligible for healthcare benefits.

Domestic Partner Affidavit (if applicable)

NOTE: HRCF cannot accept plans that require state registration for proof of domestic partnership. Given affidavits provide a clear process for couples to attest to their relationship status, requiring state registered partnerships is unnecessary.





Common examples include:

- Same-sex doemstic partners only
- Documentation says state registration is required
- Domestic partner affidavit includes undue time requirements (over 1 year)

NOTE: Your internal benefits manager, TPA/Insurer, account manager will likely be very familiar with your company's eligibility and affidavit documents.
